Chairman's Report 2020/21

What a year! Whilst disrupted by the events and issues of the last year the parish council has continued to work hard on behalf of the residents of Wheelton, meeting physically when possible, virtually when not, but always in communication to ensure we are able to resolve local issues and respond to residents requirements. This year the council has been investigating funding for our annual priorities, which this year is to gain significant investment to upgrade the village play area and replace some of the rotting wooden play equipment, which we hope to have confirmed in the coming months.

A key challenge for all who reside in Wheelton this year has been the influx of visitors, walking, meeting up, having takeaways, etc. This again highlights that we live in such a beautiful village, but has brought with it issues of litter, dog fouling, parking and churning up of the canal footpath. We have had new larger bins installed, and temporary ones are on the way for summer to ensure we keep our village as clean as possible.

Parish council representatives have continued Identifying issues with highways, boundary walls, blocked gulleys and reporting these to the relevant agencies. The chairman would like to express his gratitude to all the fellow councillors for their time and hard work representing the community, and all the volunteers and sponsors (such as those who generously funded the replacement of trees in the war memorial following some widespread disease) that make our village such a good place to live and visit



Firefighters urge people to stay safe when out enjoying water beauty spots

As the current Covid-19 restrictions ease, Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service (LFRS) is anticipating many people will head to coastal locations and inland water beauty spots. Few people would think they might become a water incident statistic. But the fact is in the UK in 2019 more people died from accidental drowning than cyclists did on the road.

Half of accidental drownings in the UK occur when people didn't intend to go in the water, so simple steps to raise awareness of the risks around water and how they can be reduced will help prevent these deaths.

Kirsty McCreesh, Group Manager for Prevention in Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service says "As the weather improves and we venture out to explore, please be mindful of the dangers of open water. Even on a beautiful, sunny day water temperatures can be dangerously low, strong currents can catch you out and there may be hidden hazards underneath the surface. Whilst we want people to get outside and enjoy Lancashire we also want people to understand the risks of water, follow advice and be prepared in the event of an incident. Drowning is one of the lead causes of accidental death in the UK and it is preventable.

- Never swim alone in case you need help
- Don't drink alcohol when undertaking water related activities, it impairs judgement and your ability to swim
- Avoid walking routes near water if you have been drinking alcohol
- Don't dive or jumping straight into open water, this can cause potentially fatal cold water shock even on the warmest day
- Actively supervise children in and around water drowning happen fast and silently
- If you find yourself unexpectedly in the water, don't panic, extend your arms and legs out and float on your back until the effect of cold water shock pass
- Never enter the water to try and rescue someone, call 999 and ask for the Fire Service if inland and the Coastguard if you are at the coast.

The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service 2022

Do you know a voluntary group that deserves recognition for the work it does? Why not consider nominating it for a national award?

Terry Hephrun, Chair of the Lancashire Panel for the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service (QAVS) said "In 2002, in celebration of Her Majesty's Golden Jubilee, The Queen's Golden Jubilee Award for Voluntary Service by Groups in the Community was established. Its purpose is to recognise exceptional groups of individuals who are giving their time freely for the benefit of others and are making a real difference in the communities they serve. It is the highest honour that can be bestowed upon groups of this kind and is equivalent in status to the MBE.

"As such, The Queen's Award not only serves to provide recognition of volunteer groups, but also demonstrates the high respect in which volunteering is held. We all know the value of voluntary effort to support communities not least in the difficult circumstances we are continuing to face in 2021.

"Groups must be nominated for the Award - self nomination is not permitted. A group (three or more people) can be nominated if it is based in the UK, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man. The group has to have been volunteering for the benefit of people in the UK or overseas for at least three years and more than half its members must be volunteers who have the right of residence in the UK. It must provide a specific local benefit and Groups solely concerned with fundraising for charitable purposes or operating solely for the benefit of animals are not eligible."

The Award is overseen by the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS). As part of the Cabinet Office, DCMS works across government departments to provide support to voluntary and community organisations.

Nominations for the 2022 awards can be made from 1 April and the closing date is 15 September 2021.

Check your trees for Ash Dieback disease

Lancashire County Council is urging anyone with an ash tree on their property to check its health this this summer to ensure it does not become a danger to themselves or others.

Ash Dieback is a highly destructive disease caused by a fungus which has spread throughout the UK in recent years. It can lead to infected trees shedding branches or limbs, or potentially collapsing as the tree dies.

The county council estimates that around 127,000 ash trees next to roads throughout Lancashire will need to be regularly checked to ensure they do not pose a threat to safety.

As some of these trees are on private land, the council has launched a campaign to raise awareness of the issue among residents, businesses and landowners to inform them of their responsibility to make sure their trees near roads and pavements are safe.

There is no cure for the disease and it is fatal in the vast majority of cases. Contamination is beyond the point where the spread of infection can be stopped and the disease is now known to be present across 56% of the UK, including 96% of Lancashire.

The county council will be contacting tree owners over the coming months if their tree is a danger to the highway, but if you have an ash tree which could be a hazard to people or property, you should get it checked out by a qualified arborist. Now that trees are in leaf is the best time to look for signs of the disease in your ash tree/s. It's important to use a properly trained and insured person to carry out work as infected trees can be particularly dangerous.

The council's website has more information on identifying ash trees and signs of the disease, permits and licences you may need, and finding a professional to undertake any work.

There is a six week opportunity for individuals and organisations to respond. The Labour Group at Chorley Borough will be responding, but we will have to come up with a viable alternative. Individuals and Parish Councils are not expected to do but can simply express an opinion - support or object.

Caution when out and about

Earlier this year whilst walking between White Coppice, Logwood and Brinscall, evidence was found on several occasions of a variety of nails and tacks having been scattered on footpaths and bridleways, seemingly maliciously with intent to cause punctures and inconvenience to off-road cyclists. Regardless of perceived disruptions caused by cyclists, the tacks and nails were found and picked up on a bridleway, thus cyclists are within their rights to be there.

Inconvenience and damage caused to cyclists notwithstanding, there has to be concerns for the welfare of dogs being exercised on the same paths, not to mention small children in the flimsily soled wellies commonly seen, and local wildlife.





The incidents have been reported to Parish and Borough Councils, and have in turn been reported to the Rural Crimes Officer at Chorley police station.

Any similar incidents should be reported to Rural Crimes at Chorley Police.

There have also been reports of 'arrestor wires' strung between trees across trails commonly used by offroad bikers. There is no evidence of these being deployed locally, but prudent downhill mountain bikers will walk or ride a trail slowly before a full speed descent. The prospect of riding into a strategically positioned wire at full speed doesn't bear thinking about.
