#### News from your Borough Councillors

Firstly we hope that you are all managing to stay safe and well in these difficult times. There is help to be found with business advice, and financial support to people struggling due to the coronavirus restrictions. Take a look at the Chorley Together page on the Chorley Council website, or phone 01257 515151 to see what is available.

The Boundary Commission reviewed Chorley Borough Council in 2018, and made recommendations for redrafting the Ward boundaries. Because of Covid, the changes were delayed from this year until the next. This will benefit Wheelton to some extent, because all of Wheelton, together with Brinscall Withnell Abbey Village and part of Whittle-le-Woods, will be united in the new Ward, Chorley North East. This will put an end to the dividing line between one half of Wheelton and the other!

As there is still uncertainty about the election process, we would strongly advise people to consider registering for postal votes. It is easy to do online, on the Gov.uk website, or you can contact the Returning Officer at Chorley Council for a form to complete. The next elections will consist of County, Borough and Police and Crime Commissioner, most likely all on the same day.

#### EXPLOITATION ALERT CUNCH LINE CHRONICLES APP

The Cunch Line Chronicles App is advertised as 'a light-hearted, satirical take on the darker side of urban UK culture'.

In reality, this app is an exploitation risk for young and vulnerable people as it appears to have an in-chat facility which could enable grooming and recruitment to real life County Lines gangs.

The National Crime Agency, National Policing Vulnerability
Knowledge and Practice Programme and the National County
Lines Co-ordination Centre are aware of this app. The agencies are
investigating the action that can be taken to protect young and
vulnerable people from the risk of being exploited via this app.

The Parish Council wish everybody a safe Christmas and healthy new year.

### Winter Advice for residents from the County Council:

- Find out if you are on a gritting route If you are not, prepare ahead of winter. Gritting map.
- Stock up on salt/grit stock up on salt/grit for your personal use from a range of DIY stores. It's also useful to have a snow shovel, a torch, batteries and a first aid kit handy.
- Schools schools are classed as private grounds and gritting them is not a county council function. We do however give schools in Lancashire the opportunity to buy grit from us at the start of the winter. School closures.
- Take extra care during freezing conditions do not assume a road has been treated and drive with caution, ice could have formed despite our efforts.
- Clearing snow and ice yourself there is no law about clearing snow and ice on the pavement outside your property or public spaces. More information about clearing snow.
- Support for businesses we give permission for some businesses to use, at their own expense, an approved contractor to clear snow from roads that are not on the county council's priority or secondary networks.
- Travelling safely during the winter check the weather forecast before you set off and leave extra time for your journey during winter. Travelling safely.
- Don't block the road for the gritter if you park your car on a main road or gritting route during winter, please make sure it's not causing an obstruction as blocked roads could mean we are unable to grit that road.
- Looking after older and vulnerable people look after yourself and keep an eye on friends, relatives and older neighbours who may be more vulnerable to the cold weather, especially if they suffer from any ongoing medical conditions.

• **Grit bins** - how often we re-fill grit bins depends on a number of factors including weather, the number of grit bins needing to be filled, and the availability of material. Help everyone by not using the grit for purposes other than for gritting the roads and pavements in the vicinity of the bin. They are placed in strategic locations to help deal with specific hazards and using the grit for other purposes could lead to unnecessary risks to other people if the grit runs out.

## The Emergency Department at Chorley and South Ribble District Hospital

Here is a list of what you need to know about what you can expect from services available at the emergency department at Chorley and South Ribble District Hospital.

#### About the service:

The emergency department at Chorley and South Ribble District General Hospital will reopen on Monday 2 November.

The A&E service at Chorley and South Ribble District General Hospital will initially open as an adults only service.

#### Opening hours:

The department will accept patients from 8am until 5pm each day

Between 8am — 5pm, ambulances will transport patients to Chorley if appropriate.

Outside of these hours, ambulance patients will be taken to Royal Preston Hospital.

#### Coronavirus symptoms:

If you have a high temperature, loss of taste or smell or a new continuous cough, please use the NHS 111 online service: https://111.nhs.uk/covid-19/ You should only call NHS 111 if you cannot get help online.

#### Urgent medical help:

For urgent medical help, not related to coronavirus, please use the NHS 111 online service: https://111.nhs.uk/

You should only call NHS 111 if you cannot get help online.

#### **Emergencies:**

Call 999.

#### **Urgent Care Centre:**

The 24/7 Urgent Care Centre at Chorley and South Ribble District General Hospital can treat a wide range of minor ailments, for both children and adults, including:

- Minor nose bleeds
- · Cuts, bites and stings
- . Burns and scalds
- Infections (including abscesses)
- Foreign bodies in wounds, ears and noses
- . Muscular sprains and strains to shoulders, arms and legs
- · Fractures to shoulders, arms, legs & ribs
- . Dislocations of fingers, thumbs and toes
- . Minor eye conditions including conjunctivitis and foreign bodies
- · Minor chest, neck and back injuries
- . Minor head injuries with no loss of consciousness or alcohol-related
- · Minor allergic reactions
- · Minor ailments such as earache, urinary tract infections and sinusitis
- · Diarrhoea / Constipation
- · Emergency contraception

You should not attend the A&E service at Chorley and South Ribble Hospital In any of these circumstances, please go directly to Royal Preston in the following circumstances:

Hospital A&E department. Patients requiring resuscitation or suffering.

- · You are pregnant
- . You are under age 18
- You suffer a badly broken bone
- You suspect a heart attack or stroke
- · You suspect internal bleeding
- You suffer extensive burns
- · You suffer extensive trauma

In any of these circumstances, please go directly to Royal Preston Hospital A&E department. Patients requiring resuscitation or suffering from high risk internal bleeding will also be taken straight to the Royal Preston Hospital

#### Jobs in the garden for Winter

You can plant over wintering onion sets, Broad Beans and Garlic.

December is a good chance for you to prepare your soil, clear weeds and add organic matter to your soil before winter sets in. Collect any fallen leaves from your garden especially your lawn, as they act as a blanket that may encourage moss, bag them up and use them as leaf mould next year.

Remember to feed the birds in your garden and provide fresh water.

#### Using what3words

Lancashire Fire and Rescue are now using what3words. This means if you get into an accident and are having trouble describing where you are (if you're out walking, for example), you can use the app to tell them your exact location. what3words has labelled every 3m x 3m square in the world with an address made of three random words from the dictionary. For example, the 3 word address of Nelson's Column in Trafalgar Square is ///this.fantastic.notes

All you need to do is download the free what3words app. You'll be able to see and share the 3-word address of your current location and also to find out the 3-word address of your home (by typing in your address and selecting the square containing your front door). If you're renting your property on Airbnb or any other accommodation sites, you can also use it to make sure guests don't get lost by just sending them the 3-word address of the front door/property entrance (especially if your postcode goes to the wrong place!). Visit <a href="what3words.com">what3words.com</a> or download the app to find out more.

Here's a few ideas of how else we can be used:

- Reporting the exact location of crimes/incidents to the Emergency Services and local authorities in your area (Cumbria Police and Cumbria Fire and Rescue are all set up to accept a 3-word address on a 999 call)
- Listing a 3-word address on signs and websites to help people find local points of interest and attractions
- Encourage people to use 3-word addresses to help guests find selfcatering/ holiday cottages (eg sending them out on Airbnb / Tripadvisor bookings etc)
