Do I have the right to Park outside my own house?

## What The Law Says

As long as your vehicle is taxed and you are not contravening any other traffic laws, you are allowed to park anywhere on a public highway (but not on footpaths/pavements) where it is legal to do so. **Parking Outside Your Own House** 

Etiquette, good manners and common sense are the main ingredients in avoiding parking disputes. Most people would choose to park outside their own home anyway because of the convenience, but what if you have more than one vehicle belonging to a single property and there are no driveways or you have a driveway but there is only enough room for one car?

### No Automatic Right to Park Outside Your Home

Basically, it's an unwritten 'rule' that people will generally tend to park outside their own home but it's important to note that **no one has an automatic right to do so**. It's not always possible and, in addition to residents, other road users also have the right to park outside your home providing they are not contravening the Highway Code.

## Please put the right stuff in the right bin!

RESIDENTS in Chorley are being urged to double check the items they put out for recycling as part of a drive by Chorley Council to ensure the 'right stuff' goes in the 'right bin'. This is because loads could be rejected at the recycling plant in Farington if they are 'contaminated' by non-recyclable household waste being placed incorrectly in blue bins, or if items are not sorted correctly. On average the majority of items are correctly sorted and recycled, however recent checks have revealed a number of items wrongly put in the blue recycling bin such as wood, cardboard, textiles, black bags, food waste, toys, CDs and DVDs, batteries, nappies and furniture and ceramics.

Councillor Adrian Lowe, who oversees waste management for Chorley Council, said: "We have an excellent recycling record in Chorley, thanks to everyone's efforts. However, we've found that the number of wrong items being placed in the wrong bin is on the increase. This has not really been an issue before as, unless the bin is badly contaminated with non-recyclable stuff, it has been emptied as usual. But recently rules have tightened which means that the recycling plant could reject loads that are contaminated which would ultimately have an impact on the cost of collections."

The council believes that the reason for increased levels of contamination could be because the current collection system has been in place for six years and most residents believe they know what can be recycled in their blue bin; and the high levels of house building in the area has brought in more residents who may not be aware of what materials are collected for recycling. Most people are aware that the blue bin is for plastic bottles, glass bottles and jars and food and drinks tins. But not all plastics can be recycled, just those marked 1 or 2 which are plastic bottles - not yoghurt pots, butter or margarine cartons, plastic carrier bags or plastic toys. If in doubt, leave it out and instead put it in the green refuse bin which is for all other household rubbish, or take it to the Household Waste Recycling Centre at Lower Burgh."

## Jobs in the garden for December

You can plant over wintering onion sets, broard beans and garlic. December is a good chance for you to prepare your soil, clear weeds and add organic matter to your soil before winter sets in.

Collect any fallen leaves from your garden especially your lawn, as they act as a blanket that may encourage moss, bag them up and use them as leaf mould next year.



Remember to feed the birds in your garden and provide fresh water.

### **Contacting Highways**

In February 2015 Lancashire County Council approved the Highways Service Offer as part of the savings the service has to make to contribute to the overall £391 million savings that the county council needs to make.

One key saving was the removal of the Public Realm Manager role as well as an introduction of a new service response time to all highways enquiries; 20 working days.

Highways has been redesigned to work in a more integrated way, with a team based approach to dealing with issues, and to improve efficiencies the Highways Service has introduced a new online reporting tool 'Report It' which is available at www.lancashire.gov.uk/roads

This map based system is the quickest way that reports of defects and faults can be made and be received by the highways officer assigned to investigate / inspect and it is the single quickest way for those defects to be fixed.

The 3 communications channels are:

On receipt of your email it will be allocated to the most appropriate officer dependent upon the nature of the communication. That officer will investigate and an update will be available within 20 working days. Reporting it online will enable you to track the report online.



Cycling is undergoing a renaissance, and with 2 gold medal winning cyclists living close by and the success of the Chorley Grand Prix the local cycling scene is booming. With quiet country lanes and rolling hills for those on road bikes and for mountain bikers there's an impressive network of bridle ways throughout the west Pennine moors and Healey nab with its red and black graded technical trails just under a mile away. but it is not just experienced riders who can enjoy cycling in the area, the canal tow path offers a flatter, traffic free, option for those who fancy a less challenging, but just as scenic ride.

Cycling is not only fun, but a great way to keep fit and if you can cycle for your commute then you also save money on fuel. Planning your own ride from Wheelton couldn't be easier, shorter rides of up to an hour can be had riding round Anglezark, Brindle or Hoghton, and for longer rides head north towards the Forrest of Bowland for challenging hills and beautifully rolling country roads. Head west towards Southport for flat country lanes through productive arable farmland.

Cyclists are a friendly bunch and there are many residents who ride who would be able to help you out with suggestions if you are just starting out, and provide advice on the best cake and coffee shops. Thanks to its location there are also regular rides organised through ride social that meet up at Brindle community hall that cater for cyclists of all abilities and will never leave a rider behind. You can find out more about these rides on gosky<u>ride.com</u>. The mountain bike trails at Healey Nab are a community initiative developed and maintained by volunteers.
