Parliamentary Boundary Review

You may remember that we have been concerned about the ongoing Parliamentary Boundary Review which sought to move our Ward (Chorley North East) from Chorley and into a new constituency called West Pennine Moors, stretching across Haslingden and Darwen, almost to the outskirts of Bacup.

Thanks to everyone who commented on the Boundary Review website, I'm so glad to say we had a great deal of people expressing their objections.

As a result, the revised map shows Chorley North East, together with Adlington and Anderton, remaining in the Chorley constituency. To balance the numbers, rural wards in the West of the Borough will move into South Ribble.

As Chorley and South Ribble have worked alongside each other for some time now, under Shared Services agreements, then this makes a great deal more sense than the first proposals.

The Boundary Review is now under second stage consultation, so I shall be posting my appreciation of this decision. I'm told there is very little chance of it being changed again under second stage because of the overwhelming numbers objecting to the lack of transport, education, health or social links that we have with the Darwen area.

A great big vote of thanks to all dog owners in the parish and to all dog owning visitors who come to enjoy the footpaths, tracks and byways hereabouts. There seems to be fewer incidents of dog walkers bagging the poo and leaving the bag hanging from a branch or whatever; and that is great! There also seems to be less dog poo littering our pavements and footpaths too. Great credit to Chorley Borough Council for encouraging the use of all litter bins in the Borough for depositing dog poo in.

There are still some instances of dog poo being left on paths and tracks across farmland, and along the canal towpath. Pet waste can be injurious to the health of farm animals if ingested. Animals that represent a huge investment on the part of farmers and livestock managers.

And contemplate for a moment insect and bug life. As conscientious pet owners we invest in worming treatments, and flea/tick treatments for our dogs and cats. And as effective as they are in preventing infestations in our family pets, they will also kill any beetle or invertebrate that sees animal faeces as a nutritious meal and forage on it as part of the process of breaking it down and re-assimilating it into the soils. Thus interrupting that part of the food chain relied on by higher orders.

Please, please, please. Re-think your dog walks. Carry a roll of poop-and-scoop bags with you; you are rarely more than a few hundred meters from a waste bin that accepts pet poo, and clearing up your pet's mess will help protect livestock, nature, and the livelihoods of those people who rely on them.

Stay safe and warm this winter

Lancashire Fire & Rescue Service has joined forces with energy networks Electricity North West and Cadent, as well as partners including Lancashire Age UK to encourage residents to be safe when heating homes this winter.

It comes as the rise in the cost of living may see households use alternate methods to heat their home, including gas or open fires, log burners or electric heaters.

The 'Be Safe & Save' campaign sees funding from the electricity and gas network operators support the Fire & Rescue Service and Age UK to raise awareness of the risks of using these appliances, share guidance on how to use them safely, and how to keep them maintained.

The advice includes:

- · Gas heaters and fires should be well ventilated, maintained regularly and a carbon monoxide alarm should be placed in the room in case of any functional problems and to keep the household safe and healthy.
- Residents who plan to use open fires and log burners should use fireguards to prevent embers spreading to flammable items, while the chimney should also be swept regularly.
- · Electric heaters should be kept in good working order and kept away from flammable materials.
- · Outdoor heaters, barbeques, hobs or ovens should not be used to keep a room warm and, if gas-powered, pose a carbon monoxide poisoning risk.
- · Everyone should ensure they have working smoke alarms at least one on each level of the home.

LFRS is working with a range of partners to protect the most vulnerable members of the community and raise awareness of the fire and carbon monoxide risk associated with finding alternative ways to cook and heat the home. See ways you can stay safe while saving on our website. We also encourage people to register for a home fire safety check for themselves or their loved ones. By answering a few simple questions, it will provide fire safety advice specific to you and tips on how to keep you and your household safe from fire. For those most at risk, we can visit the home to provide help and advice.

Christmas/New Year Hunts

The Holcombe Harriers will be meeting with hounds and riders as is customary over the festive period. This year New Years Day itself falls on a Sunday so the event will take place on Monday 2nd Jan. Hounds will be meeting at a local farmers private premises at Brinscall Hall Farm from where they will do a parade of hounds with riders through the local area and demonstrate legal trail laying with hounds following an artificial scent dragged along the ground by a trail layer in advance of hounds being tested to pick up the scent in the normal countryside traditionally used on the day. The meet will congregate to move off at 12 noon and pass through Brinscall and Wheelton with a traditional stirrup cup served at The Red Lion, courtesy of the landlord. Consequently this area may be busy for road users between approximately 12.30 and 1.30pm approximately. I strongly stress that the Holcombe Harriers lay only artificial trails and no live quarry is pursued. The Holcombe history dates back a thousand years to Norman times when the Chiens de Gascogne were brought over from France, and the hunt enjoyed Royal patronage at several visits which took place at Hoghton Tower. The most famous of these being when King James 1 knighted the Sir-Loin of beef at a hunt dinner in the great hall in August 1617. In this way we continue to maintain our rural heritage, provide employment to hound staff and equestrian service providers and are proud to support our harrier hounds which are now and 'endangered breed' with only 8 packs of stud book harriers left in the country.

There is no meet from the Dressers Arms this year, which will purely be for the pubs own customers and their parking and not allied to the Holcombe Harriers on this day. All the land used on the day for the event is at the private behest and permissions of the very generous landowners to whom we are very grateful as they ensure in so doing that a tradition can continue in its 'modern and legal' form of today. We do hope that the local community will appreciate the ethos of this modern activity & enjoy the spectacle as they usually do.

We fully welcome their support & wish everyone the best for Christmas and the New year ahead in these economic and financially testing times.
